Because of the success developing the Mayo Clinic, Dr. Boice and Dr. Willis were in-spired to build their own clinic. Recognizing the need for preventive medicine, Dr. Boice and Dr. Willson recruited Dr. Claiborne T. Smith in 1919 to practice General Medicine. Dr. Ivan Battle, an established general practitioner in town, suggested that Dr. Smith go into the new field of Internal Medicine. Dr. Smith spent a year studying at Harvard and then returned to Rocky Mount. In 1922 Dr. Smith was invited to join Drs. Boice and Willis as a hospital intern. He developed a clinical laboratory which became so popular that the Clinic with the hospital estab-lished a School for Laboratory Technicians. Through their innovative and comprehensive ap-proach to medicine and health care, the triad of Boice-Willis-Smith at Park View Hospital pros-pered.



Battle's son-in-law, Edward R. Hines until he left Rocky Mount in 1922. Mrs. Alice Battle allowed her nephew, H.S. Sorrell to operate the funeral home as Sorrell's Funeral Home until his death on September 9, 1936.

Edward R. Hines, the son-in-law of L.L. Battle returned from Washing-

ton, D.C. and operated the funeral home until his death in June 1938. After Edward R. Hines' death, Mrs. Sarah Sorrell, the widow of H.S. Sorrell operated the funeral home until she sold the business to W.H. Hunter. This was the first time the business was sold.

W.H. Hunter changed the name of the business to Hunter's Funeral Home. He operated the funeral home until he sold the business in 1980 to Mr. and Mrs. James E. Odom, who operated the funeral home under the name of Hunter-Odom Funeral Services.

During October 1996, the funeral home was sold to Chester Clack, who operates the funeral home under the name of Hunter-Odom Funeral Home Services.

Transform a playroom into a space that grows with the family

Parents typically make certain changes around a home to ensure it's accommodating to children. Childproofing is a necessity, but entire rooms also may be transformed with children's enjoyment and well-being in mind.

Create a quiet learning spot

As children grow up, they may need to spend more time studying. Transforming a playroom into a library or a study space can provide that out-of-the-way spot to get homework and studying done. Adults in the home also can use it for reading, paying the bills or any other task that requires concentration and quiet.

Build a home gym

If the space is large enough, bring in some workout equipment and make the play space one that encourages exercise and fitness. You may not even need large equipment and can utilize interlocking foam tiles that already may be in the playroom. With some free weights, resistance bands and even your own body weight, you can perform a number of beneficial exercises.

Expand your living space

If the playroom currently abuts another room that can use some more real estate but is separated by a wall, take down the wall to increase the square footage.

How to create a greater work/life balance

In fact, the organization Mental Health America® notes that when workers' lives are balanced and workers are happy, they are more productive, take fewer sick days and are more likely to remain in their jobs. Each of those things benefits workers and employers equally.

With so much to gain from creating a greater balance between work and life, professionals can consider these tips to do just that.

- Make a concerted effort to be an effective communicator. MHA notes the benefits of being honest with colleagues and superiors when challenges feel overwhelming. Open and effective communication can be a great way to solve work-related problems, but MHA urges professionals to remain calm and suggest practical alternatives when confronting such issues. Simply accepting more work or responsibilities when you already feel overwhelmed can tip the scales even further away from an even work-life balance.
- Establish manageable daily goals. MHA reports that research has found that individuals feel less stressed about work when they feel as though they have more control over it. Setting daily goals is a great way to achieve that sense of control, and this can be as simple as creating a daily to-do list.
- Seek alternatives to your working arrangement. Previously unthinkable working arrangements are now possible after companies were forced to confront pandemic-related changes to their operations. If you've found it im-



possible to create an equitable balance between work and life, speak with your supervisor about alternatives to your arrangement. Flex time and hybrid working are some measures that could ensure you have as much time for your personal life as your professional life.

• Unplug at the end of the workday. One of the simpler, though not necessarily easier, ways to create and maintain a greater work-life balance is to unplug at the end of the workday. Turn off work-related smartphone notifications at the end of the work day so you aren't tempted to work during those of times of day that you've earmarked for your personal life. Smartphones can be addictive, so unplugging could test your resilience. If possible, block work-related notifications automatically after a certain time each day so you don't have to turn them off manually. Once the blocking is automated, you might not think twice about all those missed emails.

There's no secret formula for establishing a healthy work-life balance. But various strategies can help professionals achieve greater balance between their professional and personal lives.
